Training Department

The year 2023 marked another successful and productive period for the Training Department's Adult Resources section. Building upon the achievements of the previous year, we continued to strengthen our training programs and expand our offerings to better serve our members.

We continued our tradition of delivering Woodbadge training courses, which remained highly sought after by our members. Responding to increased demand, we expanded our capacity by conducting two Pathfinder courses, a testament to the growing enthusiasm for our training initiatives.

We were delighted to welcome Josef Camilleri to the Adult Resources team, further bolstering our human resources. With the additions of Maria Catania and Kimberley Vella from the previous year, our team is now well-equipped to meet the evolving needs of our members and deliver a wider range of training opportunities.

In 2023, a total of 34 individuals successfully completed their Pathfinder training, with 37 completing the Basic course and 26 finishing the Advanced course. Additionally, we welcomed 127 participants who embarked on their journey with the Getting Started courses, highlighting the continued interest and engagement within our community.

This year, we introduced several new training initiatives to cater to the various interests and skill-sets of our members. Notably, we organized our first Inclusion and Diversity seminar, integrating essential topics such as Safe from Harm awareness. Furthermore, our ongoing Food Handling and First Aid courses continued to provide vital skills to our members. Additionally, we launched skills courses focusing on pioneering, orienteering & map reading, knife and axe handling, and backwoods cooking, providing opportunities for members to refine their outdoor skills.

With the successful addition of new training courses in 2023, our aim for 2024 is to maintain this varied range of offerings and continue tailoring our training programs to meet the evolving needs of our groups. We remain committed to supporting our members' growth and development while fostering a safe and inclusive environment within our scouting community.

The Adult Resources team looks forward to another year of collaboration, learning, and growth as we strive to empower our members with the skills and knowledge they need to thrive in their scouting

What makes an Agora so special is that it is an event run "for Rovers, by Rovers". As a result, the event looks at issues that are of importance and relevant to young people in our society today. The 2023 edition was held in Portugal from 12th April to 16th April, with Janice Galea and Chloe Muscat representing Malta. Agora is an annual event that provides a valuable scouting experience to all participants. This year's main topic was the Earth Tribe sustainability project.

IC Network meetings



In 2023, two IC network meetings were held, both of which we attended. The first took place in Belgium from 4th to 7th May, and the second in Budapest from 24th to 26th November. During the Belgium meeting, our IC was invited to lead a session

on preparing a contingent for an international event. The November meeting in Budapest provided various opportunities to strengthen connections with other countries through the sharing of best practices and the creation of networking opportunities.

Kander 100



Kander 100 was a once-in-a-lifetime Jamboree for young people from around the world and it was the highlight of the KISC Centenary celebrations; a Jamboree bringing together Scouts and Guides from many countries and regions in the heart of the Swiss Alps. Kander 100 inspired, challenge, and educated young people through high adventure, international friendship, and sustainable development. The Jamboree took

place over 12 days, from 27th
July to 8th August 2023. 23

members coming from various scout groups attended this amazing event. Thumbs up to Sarah Galea for leading wisely this group. During this same event, Chloe Muscat was appointed by the European Region to carry out a sustainability workshop during one of the open events, while Martina Maria Grech served as an IST for the whole 3 weeks of the camp.



World Scout Jamboree - South Korea

Undoubtedly, the most significant event this year was the 25th World Scout Jamboree, held at a newly constructed campground in Saemangeum, Jeollabuk-do, South Korea, from 28th July to 18th August. A contingent of 75 members, led by Timmy Cutugno and David Grech from various local scout groups, joined over 43,000 other participants from 170 countries. Despite the organisers facing planning and execution issues, as well as heavy flooding and an intense heatwave, participants demonstrated resilience. On 8th August, the South Korean government, in cooperation with the World Organization of the Scout Movement, decided to evacuate attendees due to Typhoon Khanun. Following the evacuation, an improvised programme of cultural and historical site visits, along with pop music concerts, was arranged for the displaced participants across various regions in South Korea.

The closing ceremony was relocated to a football stadium in Seoul. During the post Jamboree, our contingent had the opportunity to visit interesting and historic places in the vicinity of Seoul. Much can be said about the experience gathered during the days in Korea. A Roller coaster of emotions and joys characterised by a huge "Festa" of World Scouting.

JOTA JOTI 2023

Over 1,000 members from 21 groups participated in this year's edition of JOTA-JOTI, organised by WOSM from 18th to 20th October. This is the world's largest digital Scout event, held on the Internet and airwaves, connecting millions of young people worldwide for a weekend of activities promoting friendship and global citizenship. JOTA-JOTI allows young people and volunteers to join fun and engaging group activities via the Internet and amateur radio, focusing on the development of 21st-century skills through Scouting.

The Academy 23



This year's edition of the Academy was held in Wiesbaden, Germany, from 14th to 19th November, with Sarah Galea representing us. As a member of the programme department, Sarah gained valuable insights during the event. Over the 5-day training, participants chose from four different learning paths and created personalised training plans by selecting from a variety of daily sessions tailored to their roles and needs. Sarah focused primarily on the programme, particularly the Cubs section, which is currently under review.

National Events

Throughout the year 2023, national events continued to prosper, greatly valued by the Association and esteemed by its members. The events department consistently sough to upheld high standards in every activity, resiliently overcoming setbacks and actively working to strengthen participation, thus fostering networking opportunities. The main national events of the year were as follows:

On Sunday 12th March 2023, more than 200 Ventures, Rovers and Leaders participated in another edition of the **national Scout trail**, with a mix of team-building activities along the way and an optional cook-out at the end. The trek consisted of a circular 8 km trek passing through the astonishing surroundings of il-Qarraba, Lippija & Ghajn Tuffieha Towers and the Roman Baths.

On Sunday 7th May, the yearly commemoration of Scouting and Guiding took place at Valletta. The **Annual Rally** started off with a mass at Floriana Parish Church and the parade followed passing through the streets of our capital city, where the acting President of Malta was also present to receive the salute. As expected, thousands of members participated in this event. For the first time ever, all the parade was live streamed on our social media platforms.

The pinnacle of events in 2023 was reached in the second weekend of October, when we brought our local Scout groups together to celebrate Scouting interactively with the public by organising **Festa Scouts** at Ghajn Tuffieha Scout Campsite. Through this project, the association aimed at raising the profile of Scouting in general and to celebrate the rich heritage of volunteer work and activities in the community. Thousands of Scouts from Beavers to Leaders, hailing from more than 30 Scout groups came together to celebrate 115 years of Scouting in Malta. This was truly a special occasion as we offered numerous Scouting-related activities, whilst the public attended enthusiastically and responded greatly. Some of the activities included: Abseiling, Obstacle Courses, Zipline, First Aid, Archery, Games, Pioneering, Catapults, Human table Soccer & many more.

The motto of this event was once again 'Sharing our Adventure', whereas we provided a unique and free experience to a substantial number of people especially those with fewer opportunities, to understand the benefits of joining Scouting. We showcased that we are a youth movement which continuously strives for the development of our young people through non-formal education.

Other events included the **Youth Award Ceremony** at Zurrieq campsite on 14th January and two **social gatherings**: 4th July for national staff and 5th December for national staff and GSLs.

In the final quarter of 2023, the national events department commenced preparations for the events scheduled in 2024. Collaborating closely with various departments and entities, notably sectional commissioners, it was decided to organize one or more events for every section instead of focusing on only 1 or 2 sections per year. Subsequently, a comprehensive calendar of events was published.

Finance Department

Groups

The financial performance of the Groups in aggregate is robust and performing well with a 7.9% increase in Reserves driven by a surplus in Receipts of Payments of circa Euro282,000. Reserves add up to Euro2.8 million at year end of December 2023. These are represented in the form of Liquid Assets Euro1.4 million and Euro 1.4 million in value of premises.

We are monitoring the financial performance and when possible, supporting 3 groups that reported a deficit 2 years in a row. These are sometimes attributed to timing differences for reporting of Receipts and Payments. We will be trying to iron out these differences by adopting financial reporting standards with more discipline and support from IHQ.

During the year we continued to work with the banks to reduce our dependence on cash handling while using the banking service to the advantage of the association. Although these will come at a cost, we are seeking more cost-effective services. The benefits are a reduction in risks generally associated with cash handling and help improve the quality of the financial reporting.

IHQ Support

The principal source of income for the IHQ is the Census Income charged to Members and the income from the Shop. The Income of the International, Events and Training and Programme Departments is primarily aimed at covering their costs and being the least possible burden on IHQ.

The reserves held by IHQ are just under Euro1Million. Cash Reserves reported at year end were around Euro346,000, however circa half were held or committed for specific events or commitments. The assets include a receivable of circa Euro500,000 without a fixed repayment schedule.

The surplus for the year dropped compared to the previous year, however reserves remain generally appropriate to support the regular operations of the association. However, plans the association is working on may place pressure on cashflow. It will therefore be essential to ensure sufficient funding is secured to fund additional projects and activities.

Funding Department

The Funding Commission is meant to coordinate and support Groups in tapping funding opportunities. Such opportunities vary in scale, format and also in nature. Most schemes preferred by local groups, are the National Funded Initiatives, such as the A4U or BeActive and then there are those regional schemes such as Gozo or Majjistral Funding Scheme.

Apart from national funded schemes, there is also the opportunity to apply for EU Funded Schemes such as the European Solidarity Fund and International Scheme emanating either from WOSM, Commonwealth or even the United Nations.

It is also a fact, that most Groups do tend to refrain from submitting project proposals due to their complexity or lack of information. To this effect, in 2021 the Informal Funding Network was established wherein each group was invited to nominate one representative and an alternate. Throughout these meeting, participants would be provided with expert advice and information on upcoming opportunities. So far, three of these meetings have been held and it is envisaged their frequency will increase due to new opportunities and interests arising from the Groups.

Communication is vital to secure a high success rates in submission. Whenever a group comes up with a proposal, it is important that the GSL approves and submit a draft copy of application, prior to deadline to the Funding Commissioner. This is then vetted for any possible revision and sent back to the Group. Once the group, agrees with the proposed changes, then sent it back to the Funding Commissioner who shall present it to the Chief Commissioner and Hon Secretary for the necessary endorsement.

Sometimes, there are Schemes open to one VO Registered Organisation only. Given that TSAM has one VO number, the Funding Commission will invite all interested groups to jointly draft one application with different lots. This strategy ensures that no one is left behind.

As a concluding remark, the Funding Commission appeals to all GSLs to expose youngster in the drafting and implementation of projects for that they would eventually help them in their carriers. The Funding Commission would facilitate training in both project design and project implementation and shall continue to disseminate information both through email and through the informal funding network.

ICT Department

The ICT Department had an eventful and productive year in 2023. Here are some of the key highlights and achievements:

- New PA System: We successfully purchased a brand-new PA system, with most of the funding
 provided through A4U. This system will be primarily used at National Events, enhancing our
 audio capabilities significantly.
- Annual Rally Live-Stream: In collaboration with the Events Department, we coordinated and
 executed the first-ever Annual Rally live-streamed on social media. This initiative allowed
 wider participation and engagement from those who couldn't attend in person.
- Website and Online Shop Maintenance: Continuous efforts were made to maintain our official website (scouts.mt) and our online shop (shop.scouts.mt), ensuring they remain upto-date and user-friendly.
- **Website Hosting:** We are currently hosting 10 WordPress websites for various scout groups, providing them with a reliable and efficient online presence.
- **Email Hosting:** Our department hosts email accounts on Microsoft for 21 Scout Groups, ensuring secure and professional communication channels.
- **Internet Package for Scout Groups:** We collaborated with GO to work on an internet package specifically for scout groups, benefiting at least 5 groups.
- Mobile Package for Leaders: Additionally, we worked with GO to create a mobile package exclusively for Scout Leaders, with around 40 leaders benefiting from this offer.
- Online Forms for Training and International Departments:
 - We developed an online form for the Training Team, allowing Training Advisors to submit assessment reports electronically. This new system saw at least 90 reports submitted in this manner.
 - Similarly, an online form was created for the International Department, with at least
 25 responses collected through this digital platform.
- Bulk Buy Addition: We continued to expand our bulk buy option on the online shop, adding around 15 new leaders in 2023.

The ICT Department remains committed to leveraging technology to enhance our operations and support our scout groups and leaders effectively. We look forward to continuing these efforts and introducing more innovative solutions in the coming year.
