'A National Scout Council generating new Concepts for the Association'

Dear colleagues in scouting,

The General Assembly of the 13th of May 2013 drew to a close the chairmanship of Mr Kenneth DeMartino as Chief Scout. The election of the new Chief Scout held on the 22nd and 24th June 2013 brought about the election of Dr Arthur Azzopardi as the new Chief Scout for the years 2013 to 2017.

At the first National Scout Council presided by him held on the 4th July 2013 the Chief Scout announced his new appointments, including that of the Deputy Chief Scout, Chairman of the Policy Committee, Chairman of the Awards Sub-Committee, and Honorary Secretary. At this Council meeting I had the shortest re-appointment as Chairman of the Awards Sub-Committee, a position I had held for 4 years. In less than an hour later I was appointed as Honorary Secretary, a position which mandated my resignation from all other appointments. I had never imagined when I joined the Scout Association in the early 1990s as Secretary, and later as Chairman of the Dingli Scout Council that I would find myself as Secretary for the whole Association and I hoped that the person nominating me to this post knew what he was doing.

However, I promised then and maintain my promise now to do my job in all honesty and to the best of my ability and resources for the best interests of the Association. The Chief Scout directed that all non-uniformed members elected to the National Scout Council should strive to attend the training courses organized by the Training Department to give the right signals to the Association in general. To this aim, I embarked on the courses and have completed the Food Handling Course, the First Aid Certification, the Getting Started, Pathfinder and Basic Course and hope to complete the Advanced Course in October 2014 to obtain the Woodbadge Certification. This has been a challenge considering that I am the oldest person ever to obtain the Basic Course Certification so far.

The National Scout Council immediately embarked on new ventures, the Solar Audit for secure

sites under the jurisdiction or owned by the Scout Association of Malta, discussions on forming a limited liability company to take over all financial aspects of the Association and thereby protecting the assets of Association as a whole, and the formation of a Foundation of the Association which can take over the Training division and open the way for European Funding to facilitate and improve the training and make available funds for major restructuring of the training of all sections of scouting in Malta. These were and still are very ambitious projects. Call for a Solar Audit Expression of Interest were issued and one applicant was selected to carry this project forward. Meetings with the Educational Authorities were undertaken to obtain nonformal educational status for the Association.

The National Scout Council met five times in 2013, four of which since the election of the new Chief Scout in June 2013. George Cassar was co-opted to the National Scout Council in August 2013. Dr Kevin Camilleri, International Commissioner, contested the European Scout Region Committee elections in August 2013 and was not elected to this post by only a very few votes. Yet even this has been a milestone in the annals of the Association. On the 5th September 2013, Mr Joseph Borg was appointed as Deputy Chief Commissioner by the Chief Commissioner and he took his rightful place on the National Scout Council. In October 2013 Mr Martin Azzopardi resigned as Deputy Chief Scout and as a National Scout Council member leaving another vacancy on the NSC.

At the General Assembly held on the 7th December 2013 important changes to the Constitution were approved by the Assembly members. The new Constitution now governs the whole Association and gives judicial representation of the whole Association solely to the Chief Commissioner and the Honorary Secretary, as per requirements of the Voluntary Organisations Act, of which the Scout Association of Malta is a full member. The motion at the May 2013 General Assembly that gave the right of vote to all registered leaders was incorporated in Article XVI of the Constitution. At this Assembly there was a proposal by the Hamrun Group that all Auxiliaries should have a vote and there was general agreement amongst all members that this would be incorporated in the next phase of Constitutional changes which need to be considered to place the Scout Association in line with WOSM directives. The issue that Proxy voting may not reflect the wishes of the Registered voter authorising his proxy was brought up and this was considered valid with the Honorary Secretary being directed by the Assembly to raise it at the Policy Committee.

The General Assembly also voted in favour of setting up a limited liability company and a Scout Foundation in principle to facilitate the working and expansion of the Scout Association of Malta's capabilities. The General Assembly then resolved itself into several workshops at which the question as to whether the Chief Scout and the Chief Commissioner should both be appointed by the Assembly was raised. The consensus was that there would be one elected body namely the National Scout Council with an election for the Chief Scout and for the members. The Chief Scout along with the National Scout Council would then nominate the Chief Commissioner and once approved, he in turn appoints his Executive. This again was referred to the Policy Committee for deliberation and for possible implementation at the next phase of Constitutional changes. The question of setting up a National Youth Scout Council with representation at the National Scout Council received also general approval. All of these changes are of fundamental importance to the development of the Scout Association of Malta in this 21st Century.

The Scout Association of Malta is on the right path towards this aim. But all these projects and all these changes require the dedication of all its members. The combined effort of all Leaders in the Association is the only sure way to achieve the success that all of us wish for and long for. May God protect and prosper our Association in years to come for the common good of all Scouts, young and old, active and retired.

The Chief Commissioner's Report

Dear Assembly Members,

When one mentions "non-formal education in Malta" s/he opens up a spectrum of opinions debatable on many levels regarding what non-formal education means. Browsing through the website of the "National Commission for Further and Higher Education Malta" one finds a section that lists all the organisations/companies/individuals that offer some form of non-formal education to Maltese youth amongst which is The Scout Association of Malta. The list is extensive and covers a number of different activities — it makes interesting reading as at a glance one can see who/what are the activities that are competing with the type of non-formal education offered by our Association.

What exactly is understood by "non-formal education" through *The Purpose of Scouting?* The purpose of the Scout Movement is to contribute to the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities. This is achieved through *The Scout Method*. Scouting uses a Method which is young people in partnership with adults: enjoying what they are doing; learning by doing; participating in varied and progressive activities; making choices for themselves; taking responsibility for their own actions; working in small groups such as the Patrol and Six; taking increasing responsibility for others; taking part in outdoor activities; sharing in prayer and worship; making and living out their Promise. The mission of Scouting is to contribute to the education of young people, through a values system based on the Scout Promise and Law, to help build a better world where people are self-fulfilled as individuals and play a constructive role in society. This is achieved by: involving them throughout their formative years in a **non-formal educational** process; using a specific method that makes each individual the principal agent of his or her development as a self-reliant, supportive, responsible and committed person and assisting them to establish a values system based upon spiritual, social and personal principles as expressed in the Promise and Law.

The reality is that education is a lifelong process that enables the continuous development of a person's capabilities as an individual as well as a member of society. Non-formal education is an educational activity that is not structured and takes place outside the formal system, is voluntary and is mostly active.

Unfortunately youth work within the structured educational system has received quite a lot of bad press recently due to the lack of apparent compliance with the Teachers Code of Ethics & Practice by individuals and whose actions became front-page news. Disregarding the "wow" factor and sensationalism of the press, unfortunately teachers across the board could soon be under the microscope and with them all types of youth workers (voluntary included) across the wide spectrum of youth services.

Only last month, the CEO of Agenzija Żgħażagħ was quoted by a prominent daily newspaper as saying that no law existed to cover youth workers — "With informal education, the limits are a bit blurred. Ethics are never straightforward. In fact, we speak of conscience. Workers must have the knowledge to recognise their limits; this comes with the responsibility of having to obtain a warrant."

To a certain extent, The Scout Association of Malta is well ahead as our training system already ensures that our leaders undergo specific training and have to obtain certain knowledge prior to becoming fully-fledged leaders. The Association also has an Appointment system and a Warrant system in place. It has been so for a long number of years and periodically requirements are updated, however the core requisite for the attainment of both have never changed – attending courses organised by the Training Department at Association level, supervised work amongst our youth membership at Group level and receiving the Warrant after a specific amount of time spent working with our youths as an Appointed Leader.

It has been announced that The National Commission for Further & Higher Education along with The Directorate for Quality Standards in Education are about to embark on revising the rules and regulations for entities holding the "Certificate for Informal Education". After this, the time for dilettantism will have to end.

For the past four years, the Association has been advising leaders within the Groups about how to carry out the work we do amongst our young people. Resistance to improve the methods of training and upgrading of our product will work against us individually and eventually as an Association in the long run. We are the largest youth organisation locally and worldwide; being affiliated to WOSM gives us access to policies created by forward-looking individuals who collectively have helped make



Scouts worldwide the forerunners in youth non-formal education.

The case of the supply teacher is still fresh in all our minds. The questions that were raised by the media, the authorities and even by various individual parents are far-reaching and may have consequences in the way we operate in the near future.

We have tried to create our safe-guards being fully aware of the potential of such a disaster. Our Policy Organisation & Rules has always existed, however with the latest update that was finalised at the end of 2013 and presented at the beginning of 2014, these are embedded even deeper into the updated P.O.R.

The P.O.R. took twenty months to complete. It has been on Scoutkeeper for a number of months now since last January. Although lengthy, the P.O.R. gives the Scouter a guideline on how to operate within the Scout Group and amongst our young members – all leaders should ensure that they are familiar with its contents.

The highlights of 2013:

Complete revision of P.O.R.

The national strategy for the Association was launched

A legal team set up to study the Group's property (leased/owned) to update information held about the Groups' property to ensure that all was in order in a bid to safeguard the property held by the Groups.

Launched refresher courses for all leaders of the Association aimed especially at leaders who had obtained the Woodbadge a number of years ago
Launched the Beaver Leaders' Handbook

Launched the new Venture and Rover programmes

Launch of the Association website together with new web addresses

- Ghajn Tuffieha had received full approval from MEPA and was in line with its contract with Lands Department. Had refurbished both barracks to provide valuable indoor accommodation for the Scout Groups wishing to camp there. Maintenance and upkeep on-going and demand on the rise.
- Founders' Day was organised in a different manner for the first time. Being an evening of reflection it was decided to organise a different type of event. A number of Groups attended and although not organised in the traditional manner, those who attended enjoyed a unifying experience all round.
- The European Scout Region held RoverNet and VentureNet in Malta at the Coastline Hotel. The meeting was held at The Coastline Hotel in May and concurrently, ESR Development Group as well as the European Steering Committee Core Group also met, staying at Mount St Joseph. Participation in Crocus Project by a number of Scout Groups
 Attendance at ESR Symposium in Dublin followed by the ESR Conference in Berlin in August

- A number of Rover's participated once again at Agora it is hoped that these individuals will assist the Association when required
- The Association initiated a study to revamp the Association's insurance be it for the fixed assets of the Association (including the Groups' assets) and personal accident for all its' members.

Central District Cub Camp organised

Two groups celebrated their centenary and one group its 50th anniversary

In closing, I would like to offer my heart-felt gratitude towards all our leaders (new or experienced, National and Group level) for the sterling work carried out amongst our young members; for the time that they have dedicated; for the fun they helped to spread. Your dedication and commitment has helped ensure another year of legalised mischief for all the members of our large Scouting family.

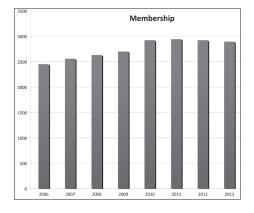

Auditor's Report



Report of the statutory auditors on the financial statements

To the General Assembly of the Scout Association of Malta

As statutory auditors, we have audited the financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2013 shown on pages 14 to 21 which are in agreement with the accounting records kept by the Scout Association of Malta.

The financial statements are the responsibility of the Scout Council. Our responsibility is to express our opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We confirm that we met the legal requirements concerning professional qualification and independence.

Our audit was conducted in accordance with international standards on auditing which require that an audit is planned and performed to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. We have examined on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the reports. We have also assessed the accounting principles used, significant estimates made and the overall financial presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

These financial statements include the income and expenditure and assets and liabilities of Island Headquarters and Ghajn Tuffieha camping complex managed by Island Headquarters. All individual scout groups have reported their financials for the year 2013. This report is limited to the activities of Island Headquarters and Ghajn Tuffieha complex. The financials of all scout groups have not been subject to scrutiny by us and a separate accountant's report has been issued on their activities.

In our opinion, and on the basis of the information and explanations given to us, the financial statements fairly present the state of affairs of the Association as at 31 December 2013 and the results for the year ended on that date and comply with Maltese legislation and the statute of the Scout Association of Malta.

Notes to the financial statements

I. Basis of preparation

The Scout Association of Malta is a non profit making organisation which is committed to further the ideals of Scouting in line with those as traditionally established and as developed by the World Organisation of the Scout Movement.

The Association operates in Malta from its premises at Congreve-Bernard Memorial Hall, E.S. Tonna Square, Floriana FRN 1480.

2. Principal accounting policies

These financial statements are prepared on the historical cost convention and have been drawn up on a consistent basis from year to year. These policies are set out below.

Cash and bank balances

Cash and bank balances include funds placed with financial institutions on a short term basis and which can be withdrawn on demand. Bank overdrafts, if any, are disclosed with current liabilities.

Financial assets

Financial assets mainly comprise Government Stocks and other securities in foreign currencies. Such assets are held on a long term basis as income generating assets and are stated in these financial statements at fair value. Movements in fair value are taken to the Accumulated fund account.

Foreign currencies

Amounts in foreign currencies are translated to Euros at the rate of exchange prevailing at the balance sheet date. Differences on exchange arising on conversion, if any, are disclosed as movements in the reserve fund.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets comprise improvement to premises, office equipment, furniture and fittings and camping and other accessories. These are initially stated at cost taking into account any subsequent depreciation at the balance sheet date. The depreciation rates used for this purpose vary between 10% to 25%.

Stocks

Stocks mainly comprise medals, badges and publications which are stated at cost and after taking into account adequate provisions in order to reduce the value of stocks to their net realisable value.

3. Taxation

No provision for taxation has been made in these financial statements in view of an exemption from income tax in terms of article 12 of the Income Tax Act, Cap. 123.

12. Commitments

i: The Association had acquired from the Government of Malta a plot of land at Ghajn Tuffieha on temporary emphyteusis for a period of 49 years in terms of which it is committed to incur development costs of not less than eur 116,469. An annual ground rent is payable, reviewable every 5 years by an increase of 10% per annum at the end of each five year period.

ii: The Scout Shop is being managed in such a way that the Association receives a fixed contribution incorporating a percentage of the shop's annual sales.

13. Contingent liability

The Scout Association has received notification from the VAT Department to pay arrears in relation to Eco contributions incurred by the Scout Shop. The Association has already written to the Department stating why it is not liable for this amount and as such no provision for these amounts has been made in these financial statements.

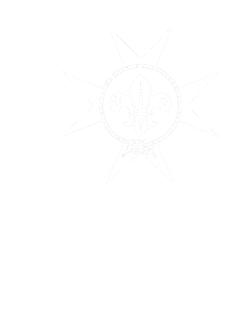
