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### **Chief Scout's Introduction**

First of all, this is the first formal opportunity I have to thank you for the trust you have placed in me – Thank You. I also wish to thank the Council, IHQ staff and the Executive for the work that has been carried out during the past 12 months. My experience with this Council has been positive and the individual and collective enthusiasm has been great. We have met more than once a month and had two full day sessions in the past 12 months.

Secondly, I wish to highlight the main issues tackled by the Council. The first major task was to participate, together with the Executive, in the GSAT audit. The Association passed the audit successfully. The GSAT – the Global Support Assessment Tool is a Quality Standard owned by the World Organization of the Scout Movement that assesses compliance of National Scout Associations towards international best practices in Good Governance and Quality Scouting. The purchasing policy of the Association was updated. We have also amended the Bye-laws – these did not reflect the current Constitution and in two cases, laws had been superseded by ad-hoc procedural documents. TSAM Ltd has been set up, operating procedures are being established and the Company will start operating this month. Terms of reference for the Finance and Audit Risk Committee have been established. During this AGM, TSAM Ltd, LEAP Foundation, the Youth Forum, and the Fellowship have been invited to present their activities for the past year.

As you can see, all these issues have the objectives of improving good governance through further development of the procedures and structures at IHQ. Have we done enough? No, there is still more to be done and I apologise for that, while promising you that we will continue working on these lines during the next year.

Thirdly, today we will be voting on a motion related to districts. A group of members of the Assembly got together, agreed on a motion and presented it to the Assembly. May I encourage you, if you feel strongly about any issue, to take the same approach, even if need be requesting an extraordinary general assembly if the issue is particularly urgent.

Finally, this is to request your help. We need the input of lay persons to fill various positions at IHQ – for example, there is still a vacant post at the Finance and Audit Risk Committee. These posts need not be, and in some cases should not be, filled by active scouters. Parents and scouters who are no longer active would be the ideal candidates. Please, when we circulate these calls, do reach out to persons who may be able to participate. Your input can make a big difference to the quality of service the IHQ can offer.

### **Honorary Secretary's Report**

Dear colleagues in scouting,

The General Assembly of the 26th May 2015 completed the last changes to the Constitution to bring the Scout Association of Malta in line with the constitutions of other National Scout Organisations in Europe and in the world and satisfy the requirements of the Voluntary Organisations Act. Principal amongst these changes was the election of the eight members of the National Scout Council as per article 20.2a of the Constitution. The elected members were (in order of votes received) Mr Mario Ellul (94), Mr David Darmanin (65), Mr Joseph Abela Medici (64) Prof. Joseph Cacciottolo (63), Mr George Cassar (51), Mr Andre Cauchi (44), Mr Anthony Debono (44) and Mr Joseph Saliba (40). Along with the other members on the Council (as per Constitution Articles 20.2 c, d and e) a secret vote was taken at which Mr George Cassar was elected Chief Scout. Regretfully on the 8th October 2015 the National Scout Council passed a resolution, voted on by secret ballot, to terminate the membership of Mr Joseph Saliba as per Rule 15.2b and 15.6a of the POR. This created a vacancy which necessitates the election of a new member on the National Scout Council.

The Chief Scout presided over the National Scout Council 13 times since June 2015, namely on the 4th June, 2nd & 30th July, 18th August, 17th September, 8th October, 12th November, 3rd December, 4th February 2016, 3rd March, 7th and 26th April apart from a whole day informal meeting in January 2016 to consider much needed updates of the byelaws of the Association.

One of the most notable resolutions of the Council during this year was the actual formation of TSAM Ltd. Its concept had been approved by the General Assembly of the 7th December 2013 (Agenda Item 5) but the Memorandum and Articles of Association of TSAM Ltd were approved by Council on the 30th July 2015 with the first two directors of the Company having been approved at Council Meeting of the 11th May 2015. These were the two legal representatives of the Association, albeit these appointments were made on a temporary basis. On the 3rd December 2015 Council approved the application of Anthony Rizzo, Gordon Dimech and Robert Gonzi as a further three Directors of TSAM Ltd and in the same sitting Anthony Rizzo was appointed as the first Chairperson of the Company. Again at this same sitting the Business Plan for TSAM Ltd was approved.

The Council also approved the formation of the LEAP Foundation and this was enacted by public deed with its first Chairman being the Training Commissioner.

The months of July to September 2015 were almost completely taken up with the preparations for the GSAT Audit under the auspices of WOSM. A significant number of documents had to be prepared to partially satisfy the requirements of the GSAT exercise. The hard work put into this exercise had its reward with the Scout Association of Malta being awarded the GSAT Audit Certification. The GSAT Audit exercise however opened up new requirements which have to be satisfied to maintain the good standing of the Certification.

Various sub committees were set up within the Council and with co-option of other sub committee members to assess the applications for directors of TSAM Ltd, for the Finance Sub Committee, and to draft the Business Plan of TSAM Ltd. All these sub-committees submitted their reports which were approved by the National Scout Council.

The NSC approved the National Procurement Policy (4th February 2016), the Business Plan of TSAM Ltd (3rd December 2015), the re-structured Bye-Laws (Bye-Law 1 to 10) as well as the Role Descriptions for Commissioner for Finance, International Commissioner and

"Your National Scout Council" Commissioner for Programme Development. The NSC also approved the terms of reference of the Finance, Audit and Risk Committee (Meeting of the 3rd March 2016). The NSC is in the process of creating a Procurement Policy for the Groups. In this way substantial requirements imposed by the GSAT Audit would have been satisfied. The Declaration and Code of Conduct Form, a requirement of GSAT, was also prepared, approved and signed by all members of the NSC and the general membership is also being asked to submit and sign this Form.

The Council chaired by the new Chief Scout once again approved the appointment of Prof. Joseph Cacciotolo as the Chairperson of the Awards Sub-Committee and he, in turn, appointed his members.

The Council held many sessions dealing with the new uniform, which is now in its final stages of completion. On the 7th April 2016 the Council voted to abolish the use of head gear with the new uniform.

The NSC agreed to ask LEAP Foundation, TSAM Ltd, the National Scout Youth Council and the Scout Fellowship to present reports to be included in the Annual Report of the Association. Again this conforms to the requirements of the GSAT Audit. It also agreed to examine the possibility of promoting a standard regulatory statute for individual Groups in order to allow them to request separate VO numbers though this would require a separate chapter to be inserted into the POR. The resolutions of all General Assembly decisions from June 2009 to the present day are being compiled to ensure adherence. Finally the NSC directed the NSYC to organise without undue delay a National Scout Youth Forum to elect the new Council of the NSYC.

The NSC also approved the application of the Scout Association of Malta to host the Mediterranean Jamboree in 2017 and to host the European Region Conference in 2019. To this end the Association has already submitted its bid for this event.

As the current Honorary Secretary, I have now served on the National Scout Council for 7 years, the last three as Honorary Secretary. I have served as Secretary to the National Scout Council, to the Executive and to the District Meetings as well as most other official meetings with Groups or with Ministerial entities. Once again, I promised then and maintain my promise now to do my job in all honesty and to the best of my ability and resources for the best interests of the Association. As I submitted in last year's report the work of the Honorary Secretary does not rest only with attending and taking minutes of all meetings. It involves answering the myriad of emails received, and answers required to be sent practically on a daily basis, preparing the documentations for General Assemblies, preparing detailed minutes of all meetings and attendance to meetings requested by the Chief Commissioner. I

May God protect and prosper our Association in years to come for the common good of all Scouts, young and old, active and retired.

# The Chief Commissioner's Report

The Scout Association of Malta kicked off the year with a landmark ballot for the new scout uniform for the whole Association. For the first time in the Association's history, our youth members were invited to be part of the decision-making process as we allowed our members from age 11 upwards to decide for themselves by voting for their preferred uniform colours. As an Association we not only advocate youth empowerment but we practice it and encourage all our adult members to do the same – if not, we are surely failing in one of the most important aspects of our work with youth.

Scouting is based on youth empowerment. When Baden Powell our Founder created the first camp on Brownsea Island, boys were divided into small groups and the Patrol System was created. The Patrol System is the back-bone of Scouting and it is the envy of many youth organizations world-wide. The patrol system is the zenith of youth empowerment.

We have a huge opportunity through our Sectional Scouting Programme to mould the younger generation in a positive manner – Scouting's approach to non-formal education is unique which is why it has withstood the test of time worldwide. The challenges increase each year as we have to face the ever- changing societal issues, but as a Movement we are succeeding in meeting the challenges.

Our policies on religious/gender/sexual discrimination, our guidelines on social media use etc. have been in place well before the emergence of such issues in Malta. This is mostly thanks to our forward-looking teams that have in the past and at present worked alongside the European Scout Region and WOSM. With their backing, local Scouting has a wealth of tried and tested resources to tap in to.

As an Association, we do our best to be prepared for the times ahead. What we require from our adult membership is that our policies and guidelines are adhered to. There is no excuse for not being aware of the Association's policies – these are uploaded on Scoutkeeper and updated regularly – with access for all our members. We still have a very tiny fraction of "old guard" that persists in steering the Scout Group (and the members within) on their own personal agenda, ignoring the Association's Policies and Guidelines at all costs......and for what? The Association is not mine; the Scout Group does not belong to these individuals either – we are all part of one whole Association. One big Scouting family and it is our duty to carry out our obligations correctly.

I refer to our Scout Promise and Law annually. If, as Scouts we truly lived by our Scout Promise and Scout Law, then issues of misconduct by an adult Scout would never be an issue. However, not all practice what we advocate. How can one expect that the young people in our care grow to be respectful citizens of tomorrow's society when the example that we give is one of disrespect of our own Policies and Guidelines?

One may wonder what this has to do with the uniform ballot. Quite a lot actually! The uniform ballot was an opportunity for us all to acknowledge one of the pillars of Scouting – youth empowerment. Instead we had a handful of Groups that not only did not encourage the youth in their responsibility to think for themselves, but actually ordered them to vote for colours chosen by adults in the Group or not vote at all. One may question who these adults taking such decisions are. Is it the combined Scouters' Meeting or just the misinformed idea of only one Leader? Where is Scouting here? Why are we failing to transmit one of the pillars of Scouting down to grass roots level? Are we so afraid that if

we teach a youth how to think, they might not think so much of us? We are supposed to up our game, not dumb it down.

Thankfully this issue is certainly not one that is present in all our 40 Scout Groups. It is only a small handful – actually, one only needs one hand to count the Groups that try and discredit the Association for their own ends. However, although very small, nonetheless each one is a missed opportunity. And sadly, it is the youth members that end up being at the losing end. There are times, when youth recognise that the system of governance within the respective Group is not working for them, and that is when we lose promising members. It is sad, because Scouting has so much to offer, but when it is delivered badly, the loss is tremendous.

On the other hand, I would like to personally thank all those Scout Leaders who encouraged their Scouts to participate in the ballot. Some not only encouraged their Scouts to go for the poll but took this opportunity to another level and set up polling booths within their Headquarters and explained how the ballot would work. So well done to those forward-looking Scouters sharing the Scouting vision.

Onto more positive matters – GSAT – what exactly is GSAT and what was all the fuss about? GSAT is a "standard" (similar to ISO standard in Industry) by which the operations of Scout Associations or Scout Organizations worldwide are being measured by WOSM. As an Association we felt that it was judicious to carry out the audit to better understand where our strengths as well as our weaknesses lay. The preparations for the GSAT audit were rigorous as all operations at IHQ level were to be scrutinized by the independent Auditors sent to audit us. The up-dating of all necessary documentation, the creation of additional documentation from scratch, took months of preparation well before the Audit was carried out.

The whole audit took up two whole days of rigorous questioning and checking of the Association's practices. The objectives of the audit were:

- 1. To assess the extent of The Scout Association of Malta's compliance level with the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM) Best Practices as outlined in the "Global Support Assessment Tool for Quality in Scouting"
- 2. To measure The Scout Association of Malta's performance against these Best Practices
- 3. To provide The Scout Association of Malta with specific recommendations that can be translated into an internal management tool for continuous improvement purpyfoses.

The Audit coverage and scope of best practices that were audited:

- 1. NSO WOSM Institutional Requirements
- 2. Governance Framework (Constitution, General Assembly and National Board)
- 3. Strategic Framework
- 4. Integrity Management
- 5. Communication, Advocacy and Public Image
- 6. Adults in Scouting
- 7. Recourses Allocation and Financial Controls
- 8. YouthProgramme
- 9. Growth Potential
- 10. Continuous Improvement

The recommendations received one month after the audit was completed showed that although we are a small Association in comparison to the larger more affluent European Scout Associations, we fared extremely well and passed the test. It was a good rubber-stamp of approval for us all. As an Association, we are on the right track and need to keep travelling in that same direction to ensure good governance, transparency and above all, good Scouting methods (a full report can be downloaded from Scoutkeeper "Downloads" section).

The GSAT audit was carried out on Good Governance at IHQ level only and the certification of best practices was issued on this criteria, however it is the intention of the Association that these best practices are eventually carried out at Group level and will be audited at Group level too.

The year 2015 was again a year full of hard work, progress and improvements in all Departments at IHQ level.

The Training and Programme Department continued with it achievements to polish up the Training Programme for Adult Leaders as well as continuing with the never-ending process of updating the Sectional Programmes, whilst concurrently organising Leadership Courses from entry level up to Advanced, in addition to ancillary courses to enhance the Adult Leadership Training Programme.

- New badges have been designed to project a modern design and approach for all the Sections;
- the creation and foundation of LEAP Leadership, Empowerment and Adult Progress its' main aim is To maximise the development potential of adults and young people in leadership skills, empowerment and personal development using the Scouting methodology.
- the Training Department continued with its' negotiations with Scouts
   Australia regarding *E- Learning* which will be incorporated on our online media.
   E-Learning will be launched in 2016 and will facilitate the training of adults online.

The International Department continued with its efforts and support to Scout Groups on the International sphere.

- Throughout the year, a number of Scout Groups participated at various International Scout Camps.
- In July/August Malta was represented at the World Scout Jamboree in Japan with the participation of 28 scouts from a number of Scout Groups;
- the participation at the 8<sup>th</sup> Educational Methods in Turkey
- "The Academy" in Portugal
- The International Commissioners Forum
- Other educational Seminars and Fora.

The Funding Department, although still in its' infancy has continued to grow and improve, offering assistance to a number of Scout Group and the Association throughout 2015;

- Erasmus+ Youth exchange within our local Scout Groups 3 Local Scout Groups have obtained funding to host European Scout Groups during the summer of 2015.
- Erasmus+ European Voluntary Service in 2015 we have seen a number of European youths volunteering to work at Ghajn Tuffieha Campsite for a period of 6 months. The project started in October 2014 and ended in October 2015. This project was also extended in the summer months of 2015 with an additional participation of 4 volunteers in July and August.
- Malta Council for the Voluntary Sector established a Youth Voluntary Worker Scheme where The Scout Association was given the opportunity to offer its members a volunteering scheme of working between 15 to 20 hours and at the same time receive a small stipend.
- SIS Funding the Association and a number of Scout Groups benefited through projects that they created together.

Agenzija Zghazagh – through the Training & Programme Department as well as the Funding Department, the Association has built a solid relationship with Agenzija Zghazagh. In 2015, negotiations were undertaken to create an educational programme between The Ministry of Education – Agenzija Zghazagh and The Scout Association of Malta to offer an educational programme based on Scouting and outdoor activities for senior school children. The programme "Outdoor Plus" was finalised in 2015 and will be launched in 2016.

The Procurement Department – throughout 2015, the department has continued to flourish, establishing a good working relationship with a number of suppliers (locally and abroad). The major task of the Procurement Department is to source good quality suppliers charging a fair price with efficient delivery times to meet The Scout Association's requirements.

The Administration Department – this department acts as the liaison between all departments and supports other departments and the Chief Commissioner administratively whenever required.

Two new departments were established in 2015. Both departments were sorely needed and both have had a huge positive impact on the Association - The National Events Committee and the Public Relations Department.

The National Events Department was formed in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2015 when a number of volunteers from different Scout Groups came forward to set up a Committee to organize National Events for the Association.

This committee comprises Group Scout Leaders, Sectional Leaders, Support Leaders, Assistant Commissioners and is chaired by a Chairperson.

The Public Relations Department was set up in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter of 2015 with an Assistant Commissioner taking up the role. Since the incumbent took office, the progress is visible and palpable with the Association receiving much-needed exposure in all genres of media.

Ghajn Tuffieha Scout Campsite – the campsite has continued to grow in popularity – largely thanks to the hard work carried out by all volunteers (both past and present) at the campsite. It is not easy to keep such a large property running smoothly and efficiently, however, where there is a will there is a way and Ghajn Tuffieha has time and again proved this saying to be correct. The campsite has seen an increase in the number of bookings with the majority of weekends having 60% - 90% occupancy. The weather naturally has a great say in the popularity of camping, and whilst we mourn the fact that the past months have been desperately dry, from a camping perspective, it did help encourage campers to venture out and camp.

After the establishment of the three Scout kitchens, the tourist kitchen, EVS accommodation and Kitchen, and refurbishment of the barracks, the management of Ghajn Tuffieha has concentrated on necessary maintenance and upkeep of the site. New projects are in the pipeline, but for the time being the campsite is concentrating on creation of resources before embarking on anything new.

I would like to thank all the team at National Level for their continuous efforts throughout 2015 in support of the Association, who together with the support of the National Scout Council, have all worked hard to achieve in 2015. Without the support and hard work of each and every one, this would not have been possible.

Last but not least, I would like to thank each and every adult member of the Association for their time, their dedication, and their commitment to Scouting, whether at Association level or within their Scout Groups and Sections. At a time where individualism, arrogance and selfishness are on the increase worldwide, as a Scout volunteer working within the community we can be a beacon of hope. We are all the future of Scouting - upon us lies the huge responsibility of ensuring that through our efforts we create better Scouts and better individuals who in turn will go on to be better citizens of the world we share.

We can make a difference! Together, we can build a better Word!

### **National Scout Youth Council Report**

By the time of the General Assembly it would have been 2 years since the organization of the first National Scout Youth Forum and hence election of the National Scout Youth Council. These two years has brought about a number of adventures as well as challenges.

The year involved two uniform votes, which for the first time in the association's history included all youths aged from 11 years upwards. The NSYC was also one of the main supporters of supporting an online vote enabling more members to vote. Whilst involving youths at such an important decision was quite a milestone, one has to query to not so strong voting turnout... Do our leaders understand the true meaning of not only youth involvement, but true empowerment? Should we embark on better training on this aspect if we boast we are the largest youth organization in Malta?

The NSYC also drafted three resolutions "Education, Promotion and Access to Information with regards to Elections and Referendum", "Online Voting for Elections and Referendum" and "Format of General Assemblies" for the General Assembly 2015. Due to the length of the last assembly, these resolutions were dropped at the last minute. We continued supporting their spirit through our active participation in the National Scout Council.

SWAGS Way Forward Meeting was also organized in June 2015 with representatives of Units and Crew. It was agreed that the NSYC should not try to create an award system but rather enable youths to meet for both discussion and fun. Throughout 2015, we also supported Form 5 scouts to participate in the Social Innovation Challenge organised by Young Enterprise and Microsoft Malta. Our participation in KNZ has also been regular although it is our dismay that the potential of such body is not often understood or utilized by the member organisations. The NSYC was also represented in Commonwealth YouthCAN at CHOGM Youth Forum. iScout, an international online treasure hunt, organized locally by NSYC in 2015 was move to the hands of the International Department in 2016.

Throughout 2015 Youth Council also drafted a detailed by-law consisting of the statue for both forum and council, provided a consultation period to our members and the document is now in the final stages of being approved by the National Scout Council.

Another project that the youth council started in 2015 was the 'Young Leaders Sub-Committee' which tried to obtain the view of having our members under 18 years supporting the group's sections. We obtained feedback from 23 GSLs and 103 individual youth replies. The report is in its final stages and soon will become available to all.

Throughout the past few months, the NSYC found it very difficult to continue meeting on a monthly basis. This has been due to a number of reasons but mainly due to one bitter-sweet explanation. A number of youth council members moved away from voicing opinions (the role of the youth council) to actually implementing matters in other organs of the association such as becoming section leaders, inductees of the Training & Programme Department and members of the National Events Committee or Funding Department. I hope that the next NSYC members find more time to ensure they are truly the voice of our young members.

Meanwhile I hope to see all our youth members to attend the next National Scout Youth Forum in September 2016 to discuss the understanding of youth empowerment and elect an new council.

### **TSAM Ltd Report**

TSAM Ltd was registered by the Registrar of Companies as a limited liability company on the 10th August 2015 and was granted registration number C71793. The registered office is the Scout Association, Island HeadQuarters, Congreve –Bernard Hall, Sarria Street, Floriana, FRN 1480.

The main scope of the company is to manage the economic activities of The Scout Association of Malta with revenue received from such activities, Car Parking sites, Camp sites, Caravan facilities including picnic and recreation areas based within the Association's property in Floriana and Ghajn Tuffieha, or any other place in Malta as may be determined by the directors at any time and any other revenue received from other activities ancillary to Scouting.

The business plan was approved by the National Scout Council on the 12th November 2015 and the final version is dated 19th November 2015.

Following a call for interested persons to act as Directors of TSAM Ltd, the National Scout Council meeting of the 3rd December 2015 approved the appointment of Ing. Gordon Dimech and Mr. Robert Gonzi as Directors and Ing. Anthony Rizzo as Chairman. The Chairman and the directors joined Mr. Leslie Bonnici and Dr. Anthony Abela Medici who were previously appointed to act as Directors. Dr Anthony Abela Medici was also appointed as Company Secretary.

The company did not operate during 2015.

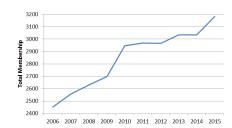

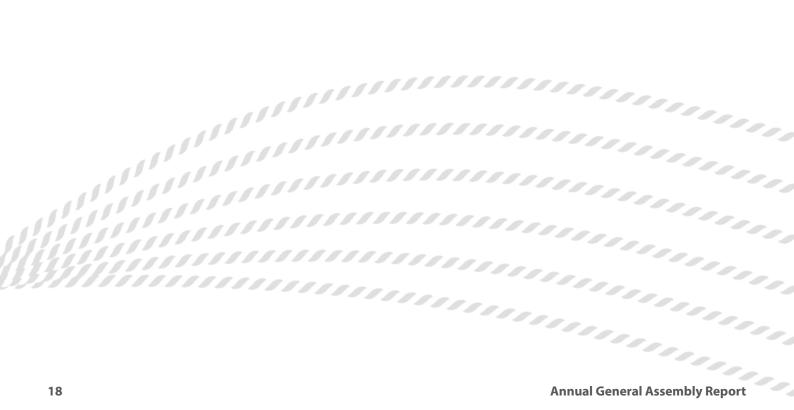

#### Notes to the financial statements

#### 1. Basis of preparation

The Scout Association of Malta is a non profit making organisation which is committed to further the ideals of Scouting in line with those as traditionally established and as developed by the World Organisation of the Scout Movement.

The Association operates in Malta from its premises at Congreve-Bernard Memorial Hall, E.S. Tonna Square, Floriana FRN1480.

#### 2. Principal accounting policies

These financial statements are prepared on the historical cost convention and have been drawn up on a consistent basis from year to year. These policies are set out below.

#### Cash and bank balances

Cash and bank balances include funds placed with financial institutions on a short term basis and which can be withdrawn on demand. Bank overdrafts, if any, are disclosed with current liabilities.

#### Financial assets

Financial assets mainly comprise Government Stocks and other securities in foreign currencies. Such assets are held on a long term basis as income generating assets and are stated in these financial statements at fair value. Movements in fair value are taken to the Accumulated fund account.

### Foreign currencies

Amounts in foreign currencies are translated to Euros at the rate of exchange prevailing at the balance sheet date. Differences on exchange arising on conversion, if any, are disclosed as movements in the reserve fund.

### Tangible assets

Tangible assets comprise improvement to premises, office equipment, furniture and fittings and camping and other accessories. These are initially stated at cost taking into account any subsequent depreciation at the balance sheet date. The depreciation rates used for this purpose vary between 10% to 25%.

#### **Stocks**

Stocks mainly comprise medals, badges and publications which are stated at cost and after taking into account adequate provisions in order to reduce the value of stocks to their net realisable value.

### 3. Taxation

No provision for taxation has been made in these financial statements in view of an exemption from income tax in terms of article 12 of the Income Tax Act, Cap. 123.

### 13. Commitments

i: The Association had acquired from the Government of Malta a plot of land at Ghajn Tuffieha on temporary emphyteusis for a period of 49 years in terms of which it is committed to incur development costs of not less than eur 116,469. An annual ground rent is payable, reviewable every 5 years by an increase of 10% per annum at the end of each five year period.

ii: For the time being, the Scout Shop is being managed in such a way that the Association receives a fixed contribution incorporating a percentage of the shop's annual sales.

### 14. Contingent liability

The Scout Association has received notification from a third party claiming damages and loss of business amounting to €37,009. It is the opinion of the Scout Association that no such amounts are payable and therefore no provision for these amounts has been made in these financial statements.
