

I Love God too...



The God's Eye started as a traditional craft from the Huichol tribe of Mexico.

It was made when there was a celebration in a particular house or when a house was blessed. This ensured that the household and its occupants lived under God's vigilant eye at all times and had His blessing continuously.




Kids can easily create many of these colorful God's Eyes with Popsicle sticks and yarn as shown the below.

What you'll need:

- String or yarn in several colors
- 2 Popsicle or craft sticks
- Glue
- Scissors

How to do it:

- Glue the two craft sticks together in a cross.
- Take one color of yarn and wrap it over and around one stick, then over and around the next, over and around the next, and so on.
- Keep doing that until the color is used up.
- Tie a different color string onto the old one with a tight knot.
- Repeat steps 2 and 3 until complete.
- Take a piece of string for a hanger, cut it, and tie or glue it to your God's Eye.
- Hang it up in your room to enjoy.



Peace Boot

God teaches us that to be good friends we have to be at peace with the World.

The Peace Boot symbolizes the journey that we have to do in order to make peace with someone. You have to put some effort into something for it to work. Things do not just happen by themselves. So no more fighting! Let us put the effort into something more craftilicious!

Alternatively we can hang it in our room as a reminder that we have to keep the peace with world.


What you'll need:

- Boot template
- Peace sign picture
- Kite paper
- Cardboard paper
- Coloured yarn
- Glue
- Scissors
- Hole puncher

How to do it:

- Cut out the boot template from cardboard paper.
- Cut out small squares of kite paper
- Glue the squares onto the boot covering it completely
- Put the peace sign in the middle of the boot
- With a hole puncher make a hole at the top of the boot.
- Thread the coloured yarn through the hole.





A Simple Friendship Bracelet

God wants us to show our friends that we care and that we should always celebrate the gift of friendship. Then why not show it to the whole world?


What you'll need:

- Bracelet template
- Bright Colours
- Scissors
- Decorations—sequins, glitter glue, etc.



How to do it:

- Enlarge and print the template on cardboard paper.
- Cut out the bracelet template.
- Colour it in.
- Put a small slit at each end so that the ends will slide through each other and the bracelet will not open up.



Nativity Stick Pup

What you'll need:

- Nativity Pictures
- Scissors
- Glue
- Colours—Pencil Colours / Crayons / Markers
- Ice Lolly sticks or Wooden Clothes Peg
- Glitter Glue to decorate
- Craft Foam or Felt
- Ribbons

How to do it:

- Print out Nativity pictures
- Cut them out
- Colour them in
- Decorate them
- Stick them onto the Ice Lolly Sticks or the Wooden Clothes Pegs

Instead of using nativity pictures, try your hand at building the puppets as shown in the picture below.


LOG CHEW:

In an other chapters you will even find how to build your own small theatre.










The lions were not so friendly this time.


Then King Darius issued a new decree. It said,


