

10. Know where to draw the line.



The Cowboy's Vest

Why do Cowboys wear vests?

WEATHER: The cowboy would wear the vest unbuttoned and hanging at both sides. Should he wear it closely buttoned, the body would perspire (would sweat), so that the wearer would quickly chill upon ceasing to exercise. If the wind were blowing hard when the cowboy dismounted to sit upon the ground for dinner, he would button up his waistcoat and keep himself warm.



POCKETS: The vest has many handy both inside and outside where the cowboy can stow away his possessions.

What you'll need:


- Large paper bag
- Aluminium foil
- Strips of ribbons
- Crayon colours
- Tape
- Scissors
- Stapler


How to do it.

- With the help of your BSL cut out the vest from the paper bag.
- Ensure that it fits.
- On a flat surface, cut from the center of the bag's open edge to the middle of the bottom. Cut out a neck hole at the bottom.
- Cut arm holes in the sides.
- Tear along bottom of vest to form a fringe.
- Decorate vest with designs such as cows, cowboy boots and hats, sheriff stars, cactus, etc.
- Cut aluminum foil circles to make silvery rosettes. Crumple the foil so that it does not remain flat.
- Put a piece of ribbon in the middle of each piece of foil and with the help of your BSL staple them securely to the vest. Put a piece of tape inside the vest to cover the protruding pins of the staples.

And along with the hat, vest and wide legged pants came the world famous cowboy boots.

The term **Cowboy boots** refers to a specific style of riding boot worn by cowboys. They have a heel, rounded to a pointed toe, high shaft, and no lacing.

Cowboy boots are normally made from cowhide leather but are also sometimes made from other fancy and expensive skins such as alligator, snake, etc. Poor animals turned into boots! Nowadays one can find boots made of synthetic materials that do not require harming animals.

One of the functions of the boots was to aid the cowboy while riding his horse. Since they have heels, boots wedge perfectly into the horse's stirrup ensuring the cowboy's feet would not slip out of it.

- Googly eyes






How to do it:

- Thread them through the holes in the horse's head to make the horse's mane.





Visit A Stable


Before and during the Activity:

- Make arrangements for your Colony to pay a visit to a farm or any other place that has stables.
- If possible Leaders should visit the place before the activity and ensure that it is safe for the visit.
- Ensure that enough manpower is available during the activity.
- Ensure that you have all written consent forms from the children's parents/ guardians with you at all time including a list of emergency contact numbers.
 No child should be let to participate should the said consent form not be given.
- Inclusion of all Colony members is important. Leaders have to ensure that the activity is carried out in such a manner that ALL colony members can participate especially those with special needs.
- One particular leader has to be appointed first aider for the activity and carry first aid kit with him at all times. He must have a valid First Aider Licence.
- Could the children help in feeding the animals?

A horseshoe is a fabricated product, normally made of metal. It is designed to protect a horse's hoof from wear. Shoes are attached on the palmar (flat) surface of the hooves, usually nailed through the insensitive hoof wall that is anatomically akin to

the human toenail, though much larger and thicker.


The fitting of horseshoes is a professional occupation, conducted by a *farrier*, whso specializes in the preparation of feet, assessing potential lameness issues, and fitting appropriate shoes.

Horseshoes are available in a wide variety of materials and styles, developed for different types of horses and for the work they do.

When kept as a talisman, a horseshoe is said to bring good luck. Some believe that to hang it with the ends pointing upwards is good luck as it

acts as a storage container of sorts for any good luck that happens to be floating by, whereas to hang it with the ends pointing down, is bad luck as all the good luck will fall out.

The horseshoe throwing game is very popular at fun fairs where one can show his ability and skill at throwing.





Visit A Cow Farm

A cowboy would not be a true cowboy if he does not tend to his herd of cows. Make arrangements for your Colony to be able to visit a cow farm.


Before the Activity:

Cowboy Cookies


What you'll need:

- 110grams unsalted butter, softened
- 100grams caster sugar
- 1 medium egg
- 1/2 table spoon vanilla extract
- 250grams plain flour
- 1/4 table spoon bicarbonate of soda
- 1/4 table spoon baking powder
- 1/4 table spoon salt
- Cling Film (Stretch and Seal Film)
- Coloured Icing Pens

How to do it:

- Beat the butter, sugar, eggs and vanilla until fully combined
- Mix in the flour, baking powder, salt and bicarbonate of soda until fully combined.
- Cover the bowl with cling film and chill in the fridge for 2 hours.
- Preheat the oven to 180C fan assisted.
- On a lightly floured surface, roll
 out the combined mixture to 1cm
 thick and cut out the shapes.
- Grease and lightly flour a baking sheet.
- Place the cookies on the tray, 1
 inch apart and bake for 5 minutes, until the edges just begin to
 turn brown.
- Cool on a wire rack.
- Decorate with coloured icing pens.
